## Zambia Newsletter

April 2004

Dear Friends in Christ,

We continue to make progress in our efforts to raise support for our future work in Zambia. We have now visited more than 41 churches and we have now <u>passed the halfway mark</u> in securing our monthly support. We must now, however, face the most difficult days (financially-speaking) as our income from the Pine Valley congregation in Wilmington, NC (where I was preaching until January) has now come to an end. We must now find ways to survive the "lean" months of this transition period until we have raised enough monthly support to cover all our expenses.

<u>Our most urgent need, therefore, is for monthly support</u>. More specifically, the need is for churches and individuals who will commit to sending continuous support each month for years to come. It is this support that will sustain our ministry in Zambia, not only this year, but in future years so that we can actually do the work in Zambia.

Of course, no church or individual can promise to send support indefinitely since future conditions might make it impossible to continue such support (or require a reduction); but, it is possible for churches and individuals to make <u>an indefinite commitment with the mutual understanding that this decision may need to be reconsidered</u> in some future year. Without this kind of support, it is impossible for missionaries to remain on the mission field without having to make unnecessary trips back to the USA in order to raise new support.

A young man waving a Bible jumped out of the back of the truck and instructed me to take a picture of him to show the churches in America the joy that comes with being a new Christian. So I did (picture below).

This experience reminded me of the deep, heartfelt joy that comes when people come to the Lord. Therefore, because of this, it is joy not fear that I associate with our upcoming, trail-blazing adventures in our new home. It is for this reason that we seek to make our new home in Zambia.
